Only fate determines which way the winds will blow. When setting a course for a desired destination that ends up being upwind, all we can do is keep tacking in harmony with whatever breezes providence sends to fill our sails — and sometimes it's best just to drop anchor for awhile and enjoy the waters we find ourselves occupying with those we love.

My Rhumb Line column this month is a bit of a bittersweet announcement: after carefully considering our options, Petra and I have decided to stay together in Hungary for the foreseeable future, most likely a year or more, as we continue awaiting the processing of Petra's US visa application. I am sad about being away from Savannah for so long, and missing out on even more Geechee activities... but I can't stand the thought of being apart from my fiancée for many months to come, and so I'll be residing with her in Budapest until Uncle Sam gets around to giving her the green light (knock on wood).

We submitted Petra's 'fiancée visa' application back in June, and a recent check of the US immigration website stated something along the lines of "80% of fiancée visa applications are processed within 16.5 months," so based on this ultra-vague verbiage, we don't expect to receive a decision till next summer or so. Until that happens, our immigration lawyer cautioned against Petra returning to the US, because a border guard could choose to deny her entry while her application is not yet approved.

Meanwhile, within a few days after my early-July arrival in Budapest, a relatively painless process at the Hungarian immigration office yielded me a temporary residence permit good through mid-October. Then in late September, I received an official residence permit allowing me to live in Hungary with Petra for up to two years, which also authorizes my

unlimited travel within the European Union throughout that time.

Since I already feel very much at home in Hungary after my 14 years of expat living here, the choice between staying in Budapest with Petra or heading back to Savannah alone was not exactly a no-brainer, but definitely not difficult. Of course I'll miss spending time with my family and Savannah friends, especially the Geechee community that welcomed me so warmly during these past few years, but I hope you all understand why we're choosing to remain landlocked in Central Europe for the unknown interval ahead.

I do regret that because of my long absences from Savannah this year. I could not better serve the Geechees as Membership Chair, or take part in more of the club's many activities that I've enjoyed so much in previous years. I'm proud of the accomplishments achieved with the 2023 Geechee Board, even while participating from afar, but I wish that I could've spent more time with boat shoes on the ground in Savannah to further boost the Geechee membership experience. Petra and I eagerly look forward to resuming an active presence as Geechee members as soon as we're able to return Stateside and rejoin the crew for the club's cruises, racing, social events, and more.

However, I remain committed to helping out as 2023 Membership Chair in any way I can during the time remaining until the next Change of Watch so, if any Geechees have leads for prospective members that I can contact this autumn, I'd gratefully encourage your reaching out; send me an e-mail at <u>n.h.robertson@gmail.com</u> anytime.

And while this decision means that Petra and I will sadly have considerably fewer opportunities to get out on the water during the upcoming

months, in a few days we'll be heading to Hungary's "inland sea" of Lake Balaton for a mini-vacation, where we might just be able to get some dinghy sailing in before the bitter onset of Central European winter renders most boating impossible here... so please enjoy Savannah's balmy 'cold' season ahead! We'll be back there aboard with you as soon as we can.

Here are some facts about dolphins giving birth:

- Dolphin gestation periods vary depending on the species, but typically last between 10 and 18 months.
- Dolphins give birth with the calf tail-first in the water. This helps to prevent the calf from drowning.

RAFTING UP!	One of the Summer's	
fun things to do	sometimes.	

Yep, it can be fun if you do it right. Otherwise, you can lose good friends in the process.

First, what is Rafting Up? It is tying up with another boat or boat(s) to be able to visit from boat to boat out on the water. We've done it before to share a meal, spend a nice evening, or fix someone else's boat (or they fix ours). Here are a few tips to keep it safe and friendly.

LOCATION: Raft up (tie up) out of the wind, current, and away from any place that may have serious boat wakes. Ideally, look for a place that is buffered by the shore with access to shallow water or a beach where kids can wade, swim, or dinghy to shore.

ANCHORING: Start with the biggest boats in the middle and smaller boats on the outside edges for balance. The

largest boat should anchor first and **COURTEOUSNESS**: set one anchor off the bow and one off the stern for added security.

PERMISSION: Maybe I should have listed this first! Always ask Now you're ready to head out. Have for permission before tying up. If you don't know the skipper, approach slowly and ask from a safe distance if you can join the raft-up. "Safe" as in both safety for the boat and safety for you personally. ③

FENDERS: You'll need several (at least two or three per side), depending on boat size. Secure the biggest ones (a minimum of 10 inches) along the side of your boat before you approach to tie up.

BOAT ALIGNMENT: To avoid climbing over gunwales, it's best to align swim platforms to move from boat to boat. Tie off at the bow and stern and use spring liens amidships to fine-tune positioning.

Ask before you crank up the "tunes." Remember that noise levels can also be a bone of contention.

The cruise this month will be to Bluffton beginning on Friday, October 20th and ending on Sunday, October 23. This is the second week of the Bluffton Seafood and Arts Festival. For those coming by motorboat, the town has a new public dock at the end of Calhoun Street where boats can be docked for the day. There is additional docking for small boats about a quarter mile further down river just past the Bluffton Oyster Company. I am expecting several of our Geechee members to bring their boats and anchor in the May River. Unfortunately, there will not be a dinghy available this year to taxi members to the dock.

The highlight of the festival has always been the Street Fest. The 2023 Street Fest will be held Saturday October 21st & Sunday October 22nd.

It includes a juried fine art show featuring over 100 artists from ten different states displaying and selling art, delicious food provided by the area's premier culinary spots, along with great music

and entertainment.

The town has several good restaurants, and I suggest that if you want to eat out on Friday or Saturday go ahead and make reservations. Three of the restaurants that are within walking distance of the landing are Okan, The Pearl Kitchen and Bar, and Old Town Dispensary. All three are within a third of a mile. Across May River Drive (HW 46) there are some seven additional restaurants. The distance is about 3/5ths of a mile from the landing.

Mary Ellen and I will not be able to make this cruise as we are spending the month of October in Boston. If we are in luck, we should have a new baby granddaughter by the start of the cruise. For everyone else, I hope you will come to Bluffton by sailing vessel, motorboat, or car. This has always been one of my favorite destinations and I think everyone will enjoy it too.

Savannah Sailing Wednesday Evening Race Series:

This summer, one of the Chatham Sailing Club members, Chris Gerards, resurrected the Summer Race Series. Every Wednesday, starting on July 12th, local sailors came together for a total of five races (ending on August 9th). We raced on the Wilmington River with the start just outside of Turners Creek at marker 27. Depending on the wind, we either went up river to marker R 40 or downriver to marker G25. The start/finish line was closed to make it challenging!

This series was so much fun because they used two really cool apps:

- Yachtbot: this tracked every boat via GPS by activating the app before the race started. It even created a video of all the boat courses which we could view afterwards.
- Regattr.com: this is a Timer that everyone was asked to use to countdown to the start. Based on GPS time, it ensured that everyone was on the same clock!

I sure hope that it will be run next summer – and I'd like to see some more Geechees out there!

Oktoberfest Regatta:

Great sailing took place on Sept. 23-24 in the Oktoberfest Regatta. Almost a dozen boats of various sizes and PHRF ratings participated. I sailed one of the J/24s from The Landings Sailing Club, *Scarlett*. (I normally sail *Gone with the Wind*, but it
